CARITAS LEEDS DAY OF REFLECTION 06 OCTOBER

Caritas Leeds, which calls together all those in the Diocese in our organisations, groups and parishioners involved in charitable activities and social action, held an annual Diocesan reflection day on the first Saturday in October. Opened by Bishop Marcus, it was launched with an introductory reflection on Pope Francis's latest Apostolic Exhortation "Gaudete et Exultate; On the Call to Holiness in the Church today" which encourages us to practice "contemplation in a world of action" by recognizing the "Face of Christ in others especially those most in need"



FAITH THROUGH LOVING SERVICE

The workshop broke into "needs' themes" to draw up priorities for Diocesan action in the coming year.

Already our Diocese has two strong working groups focusing on assisting refugees and the "Growing Old Gracefully" project, helping transform us into a 'dementia friendly' Church in the Diocese of Leeds.

The workshops examined four new areas:

- Families and Young People
- Homelessness
- Prisoners and Ex Offender
- those living with Disabilities

The focus was on reaching out and developing new areas of Diocesan and parish work. Each participant took on two different workshops and then was balloted to vote for their top two priorities for Caritas.

Whose need comes first?



The working group on Families and Young people put forward practical proposals for action which came out on top in the voting. The idea is that the development of Youth Leadership across the diocese should be examined in more detail with a view to recommending some practical actions to the Bishop. Caritas will take this forward in conjunction with Jessica Wilkinson of the Youth Office. This links well with the Synod of Bishops on Youth, currently taking place in Rome. It also links with some pieces of work that the Commission would like to undertake and for which it is seeking external funding.

The second priority voted for was working with prisoners and ex-offenders, focused on the need to support existing projects such as the West Yorkshire Community Chaplaincy Project at Armley jail. The need to support the families of those in prison and the need to support advocacy for change to the presently overwhelmed criminal justice system were also highlighted. A "Leeds Diocesan Criminal Justice Forum" was proposed as a research action project to help our parishioners understand the criminal justice system and how offenders journey through it. Based on this work, recommendations for change could be made to Bishop Marcus and



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forwarded to the Catholic Bishops' conference which has an outstanding record nationally in pressing strategically for changes to turn the criminal justice system into "a place of redemption".

Deacon Joe Cortis, the Coordinator of Caritas Leeds, commented "My aim is that the action plan will have strategic aspects but also practical aspects so that parish groups, Catholic associations, diocesan schools and chaplaincies can contribute in implementing /adopting the plan to their own local needs." 
Just Spirituality

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GRACE HOSTING - A LEEDS ASYLUM SEEKERS NETWORK PROJECT (LASSN) by Moira Flynn

When I heard about Grace Hosting I assumed it was called that because there was no money involved and it was a celebration of hospitality and the benefits that brings to both guest and host, but actually it got its name from its first guest who was called Grace!

We heard about it because Brian has been volunteering as a Befriender for LASSN for a number of years. With both our sons now established elsewhere, we found we had room to spare and wanted to use that in some way. I was unsure though, about how I would feel as a woman, if we were to have mainly male Muslim guests given the very different cultural view of women that some of them, I rightly or wrongly presumed, would bring.

As a first step we decided to volunteer at the Winter Night Shelter when it came to Garforth, hosted by the Methodist church. The people in charge there – Tim and Sue - created a lovely atmosphere of relaxed welcome and volunteers came from four different churches. We did a couple of night shifts which started about nine and involved chatting with the men if they wanted to, and generally being on hand. It was less difficult than I expected and gave me the confidence to go along for the training at LASSN for people interested in becoming Grace hosts.

The way the scheme works is that PAFRAS and the RED CROSS screen and refer guests to Grace Hosting which is managed by Jo Carter the volunteer support worker at LASSN and her team of volunteer coordinators. They place guests referred to them each night, according to which

hosts are available. Some people offer emergency accommodation of one, two or three nights, others short term and some long-term placements. Some hosts work in partnership with each other, so a guest can have longer term security, only moving between two houses. The training emphasised that we are hosting as a team and it is not up to any of us to do more than feels comfortable – this has been really helpful and probably makes it easier to keep hosting for longer. The coordinators are really good at not making you feel bad if you say you're not available when they call to ask.



We have had seven different guests in the few months we have been hosting; most we have invited to return for a second and third night. The majority have been Muslim but there has been no difficulty in terms of cultural difference around views of women. One came for consecutive midweek stays of 3 nights then for a longer 17night stay while his long term placement family went on holiday. He is busy making us a table at the moment! All have been considerate, tidy and appreciative of the chance to sleep somewhere safe and comfortable with a meal on offer and no questions asked. Most have come with very little in the way of personal belongings, a bus pass provided by PAFRAS or the RED CROSS, and all are destitute having been initially refused Leave to



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Remain by the Home Office. While they are appealing against the Home Office's decision they are not entitled to accommodation or even the subsistence funding of around £35 a week that asylum seekers receive whilst their first claim is being processed. I find it very difficult to imagine having no money at all in my pocket and being totally dependent on the kindness of strangers (as these men are), yet they have all brought good humour and dignity to the situation they find themselves in. This puts any concerns we have into a different perspective and reminds us to enjoy all the ordinary pleasures it's so easy to take for granted like the key to our own home, choosing your own food, relaxing with friends. We've also learned a bit more about some other countries and different ways of thinking about our world from our

guests as well as sharing some of our own pleasures – like the allotment, a trip to the cinema and eating fish without heads on!

WW1 CENTENARY: REMEMBRANCE IS NOT ENOUGH

The *Guild of the Pope's Peace* was a tiny and short-lived peace group founded in 1916 by Sir Francis Meynell and Stanley Morison who were both Catholics and Conscientious Objectors. They had met when working at Burns & Oates, the publishing house run by Meynell's father. The Guild's 'committee' of seven comprised the entire membership. Their main activity was to bring and distribute the peace messages of Pope Benedict XV.

Although impartial, Benedict was not a spectator to the unfolding horror of war.



While his plea for a Christmas truce in 1914 was ignored, his proposals for exchanging wounded prisoners of war and interned civilians – particularly women and children – were enacted. He created a Vatican office that worked with the

International Red Cross; procured agreements that permitted religious services in POW camps and inspections by apostolic visitors. He also contributed 82 million gold liras to support warrelated relief programs.

Seeking a "stable and equitable" peace through negotiations, Benedict issued, in July 1915, a plan that included the creation of a free Poland, freedom of the Dardanelles Strait, and the establishment of an international body that would require nations to arbitrate their differences. President Wilson would later incorporate several of the pope's suggestions into his Fourteen Points.

Throughout the First World War, Pope Benedict was the lone voice calling for a cessation of hostilities. And eighty-five years later when Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger took the name of Benedict XVI, he rightfully referred to his



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predecessor of that name "the courageous prophet of peace." The new group met with a hostile response in the religious press and the disapproval of bishops in England who were determined to prove the patriotic loyalty of Catholics (especially bearing in mind that this was

the period of Irish rebellion against British rule). For the most part the Guild was ignored, as were the impassioned appeals of the pope for a negotiated end to the war, and warnings that humiliating peace terms would perpetuate conflict.



This story is included in a new liturgy resource published by the Justice & Peace Commission with the title of 'Remembrance is not enough'. Copies of this booklet have recently been sent to all parishes and to all high schools.

As Bishop Marcus puts it in his Foreword, "The necessity of remembering has not always sat well with a commitment to working for peace..." and he goes to say "we all have a personal responsibility to make the Peace of Christ a reality in our world." It was these sentiments which led us to work with the Leeds Pax Christi group to produce this booklet to provide a glimpse of prayers and stories that help us to reflect not just on remembering the tragedy of all those killed in World War 1 but also to help us reflect on what it might mean to be a 'peacemaker' in our world today. The booklet provides a 'taster' of some of the resources that are available and signposts you to places where more detailed information can be obtained.

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PALESTINE: FOOD FOR THOUGHT

The situation of Palestinians is awful at the present time and it has largely disappeared from the mainstream media. Anne Tracey and Tricia Griffin, who are both members of Sabeel in Yorkshire, are offering a different way to bring the plight of so many Palestinians to people's attention. They do this by using Palestinian food as a way of having a discussion about wider issues.



Tricia explains "We will demonstrate a simple Palestinian recipe and give everyone a chance to taste the result. At the same time you can learn something about the lives of Palestinian families living in the West Bank."

Anne has visited Israel and the West Bank on indepth study tours; Tricia spent 3 months in Palestine and Israel as an Ecumenical Accompanier, and has also helped with the Palestinian olive harvest in small villages close to Nablus.
